## TOURING HISTORIC SEPHARDIC SEATTLE WALK, BIKE, HIKE, or BROWSE

You can "*Take a Walk Through History*" with The Washington State Jewish Historical Society. Visit the Washington Jewish Museum to take The Seattle Sephardic Tour, the society's first digital map tour of Seattle's historic Jewish neighborhood.

Jewish families settled in what is now known as the Central District and built synagogues, schools and a mikvah. Once the peddlers moved into storefronts, they patronized several Jewish businesses all within a few blocks. All of the Jewish synagogues and businesses are included in the tour.

With help from the Seattle Sephardic Network, community members who grew up in the neighborhood provided stories, videos, and photographs of the historic Jewish neighborhood which are included in the tour. Their memories paint a picture of the neighborhood — mothers walking to the kosher butcher shop with a few coins to buy food for their families... teenagers visiting the soda fountain... youth groups... a coffee shop... religious and secular schools – these are just a few of the memories that are included in the tour.

#### These stories are treasures that have been saved because of the support of WSJHS members, like YOU!

When you take the tour and watch the video memories, you are drawn into a world where entire extended families lived within a few doors of each other. From this closeness grew today's community.

The tour can be taken from your home computer or your smart phone, or you can visit the neighborhood in person.

In the old days, Seattle's Jewish residents used to take a "shabbat stroll" and walk from synagogue to home and visiting with families along their route. Take your own shabbat stroll and learn the history you helped to save.

Herbert "Herb" Marvin Bridge (March 14, 1925 - April 2, 2018) was born in Seatte, Washington, the first child of Benjamin "Ben" and Sally (Silverman) Bridge. In 1948, Herb married Shirley Selesnick and raised a family, introducing his two sons to the jevelry business that spanned both branches of the family tree.

# The Rear Admiral Herb Bridge Welcome Center at MOHAI Features the Washington Jewish Museum Front and Center

This biographical exhibit brings together oral histories, photographs, and digitized home movies to tell the story of Herb Bridge's life and lasting impact. The exhibit title was inspired from a quote by Herb Bridge about his upbringing, "I knew from day one there was a lot riding on me. That was perfectly fine." Herb Bridge understood and respected his family's expectations which resonated in every aspect of his life.

For six decades Herb was an active civic leader and philanthropist,

focused on the concept of Tikkun Olam: Repair the World.

*"I Knew From Day One"* is featured as part of MOHAI's Rear Admiral Herb Bridge Welcome Hall. The digital exhibit and the Welcome Hall were launched with a dedication event at MOHAI on October 17, 2021.Visitors to MOHAI view the exhibit through video and interpretive panels that link directly to the *Washington Jewish Museum*.
