Collaborations with the National Nordic Museum and the Ethnic Heritage Council

The WSJHS has long been a supporter of the Nordic Museum's Raoul Wallenberg Program. The event was founded years ago by past Senator, Ken Jacobsen, who is also a former WSJHS Board member.

The WSJHS collaborates with museums and historical societies around the state and, this year, converting to a virtual program was a necessity. We all heard from speaker Siavosh Derakhti, founder of *Young People Against Anti-Semitism and Xenophobia* - on the new way for young people to be involved and active in the worldwide initiative against hatred in any form.

We definitely look forward to future collaborations where we can all gather at the beautiful National Nordic Museum.

The WSJHS was invited to participate in the Nordic's first Genealogy Conference with a keynote panel presentation with WSJHS Executive Director, Lisa Kranseler, together with the Wing Luke Museum's Oral History Manager, Mikayla Woodward. The discussion was about the importance of conducting oral histories, current best practices, and what we have learned

Manager, to work on a new protocol for conducting our own oral histories. It is very rewarding to learn that the WSJHS is one among other Washington state ethnic groups that are working on preserving important voices as legacies

for our future.

Towards the end of 2020, thanks to your support of the society, the WSJHS was asked by the Ethnic Heritage Council to participate in a "Roundtable Discussion on Winter Celebrations" featuring many other ethnic communities. The WSJHS provided a presentation by long-time educator and former WSJHS Board member, Gayle Carrol, on the history of Chanukah and shared the WSJHS connection with the holiday with our own community's legacy - Samuel Goldfarb, composer of the dreidel song. Through the Roundtable we learned about various winter celebrations from the Philippines, Norway, Hungary, Uzbek, and Afghanistan and had a cooking demo on Kwanza. This was a special collaborative effort and thanks to the Ethnic Heritage Council for this important inclusion as a step toward cultural understanding.

The WSJHS works with many museums and historical societies and is open to more collaborations around the state – if you have any ideas, please do let us know.

This time it was to celebrate Ike, himself. With the sponsorship of Congregation Ezra Bessaroth, along with your donations, we built a multimedia digital exhibit about Ike and his lifetime legacy.

Building the Washington Jewish Museum (WJM) is a critical part of our work and you have continued to believe in our work. The work can be painfully slow at times, due to editing, receiving and editing photos, audio, and video, sizing, fact finding and fact checking, writing the narrative and loading all the material in the correct timeline within the digital museum.
