## WSJHS Power of Protest Sponsorship FAQ

- The Washington State Jewish Historical Society celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 2018
- Seattle is the only major US city that does not have a physical Jewish museum so our events typically sell-out or are at capacity
- To date we have over a dozen original exhibits and published 5 books focusing on the history of the Jewish people throughout the entire state
- 300 people are expected to attend BOTH the Community Opening and the film screening of *Refusnik*
- Hundreds of UW students, professors, and members of the community at large will view the exhibit over the seven-week run
- Honor to have received national traveling exhibit
- Partnered with University of Washington Hillel to bring the National Traveling Exhibit to Seattle
- Collaborated with the Seattle Jewish Film Festival to bring the screening of the *Refusnik* documentary to Seattle
- About 500 people attend the Hillel Community Seders each year
- On average 600 people visit our website, social media, and read our newsletter monthly
- Podcasts created for our **Agents of Change** exhibit in 2018 have been listened to by nearly 400 people
